To visit the grave site of my great great Grandfather 8t Grandmother at the Bald Hill Cemetery was rewarding. It was discouraging to learn that the Conner Cemetery was not fenced and that cattle and hogs were grazing in the cemetery. This land is privately owned and getting access to visit the graves should be handled carefully.

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Important Information

I Remember

"Uncle Joe" by Chuck Gross When I was about 12 years old and World War II had just ended, my family made the annual 175 mile trip from Milam County, Texas to Arlington, Texas to visit my grandparents. I recall the highlight of my trips was getting to see "Uncle Joe". Uncle Joe's real name was Joseph David Roark, the 5th son of John Wesley and Permelia Conner Roark. He was about 70 years old and just loved to trade you out of anything you owned. I think that he just enjoyed negotiating the terms of the trade. I remember him with two or three wrist watches on his left arm and one or two on his right. Of course he had at least two pocket watches, with fine chains and bobs in his vest pockets. A couple of years before, he had given me a portable radio that he had fixed up by putting a drawer pull on the top as a handle. The Rural Electrification Administration (REA) came into our area and we got electricity, so my father suggested that I return the radio to Uncle Joe. Well, on the next

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trip to Arlington to visit my Grandmother (Mary Ellen Roark), I took the radio and returned it to Uncle Joe. He just took it and we walked downtown to the radio repair shop, in the Western Auto store. We learned that it only needed some new batteries, which he had the repairman install. As we walked up the street in Arlington with the radio playing loudly, I remember Uncle Joe saying, "Now all that it needs is a proud owner". Of course the style had changed and new radios were much smaller, but I would guess that he found someone who would be happy to own that radio. That was Uncle Joe. He could always find something that you wanted, which he had, and would trade. I noticed that everyone in Arlington made an effort to speak to Joe. He was well liked by all.
