### **R-CA Basic Rules of Family Research**

### Pass along your research.

- Your research will never end. You will always identify new questions that need answers.
- Plan on continuously passing your efforts along to the next generation.

### You cannot do it all online.

 You should also use libraries, family bibles, County Courthouses, family archives, and historical societies.

### If unsure, say so.

• Simply say that you cannot prove a specific fact. Don't fudge the facts.

### Most dates are approximate.

• It is ok to use "about 1895" or "May 1814.

### Always document your sources.

• Often sources contradict one another. Be consistent.

### Use discretion.

Never lie about your reporting.

### Assume nothing.

Check all your facts and try to corroborate your facts.

### "Speling Dusn't Cownt"

### All your hard work will be "borrowed" and you will not get credit.

### Don't die with your stories still in you.

- Give them up .... ASAP.

- 5. <u>Chronicling America</u> is a database and companion website produced by the U.S. National Digital Newspaper Program.
- 6. <u>Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System</u> contains National Park Service Civil War records.
- 7. **Cyndi's List of Genealogy Sites** is a categorized and cross-referenced list of links for genealogical research.
- 8. <u>Daughters of the American Revolution</u> is dedicated to promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and securing America's future through better education for children.
- 9. **FamilySearch** is the largest collection of free genealogical records in the world.
- 10. **FamilyTreeMagazine.com** is the leading family history magazine for researching genealogy.
- 11. <u>Find a Grave</u> is the best place on the internet to look for burial and other final disposition information for your family, friends, and famous people.

# R-CA 20 Questions for Documenting Family History

1.	What is your full name?
2.	When and where were you born? Details: Time, Town, Date, House, Hospital, etc.
3.	What are your parents full names and date/place of birth/occupations?
4.	What are your grandparents full names and date/place of birth?
5.	What are your great grandparents full names and date/place of birth?
6.	How many brothers and sisters do you have? Please give a description of each one.
7.	Are you or were you ever married? Details, Who? When? Where? Date
8.	Do you have children? Details: What are their names?; Where were they born?; What are their ages?; Are they married?; Do they have children?
9.	Describe your education. Details: school(s), levels, degrees
10.	How do you describe yourself? Details: age, eye color, height, hair color, distinguishing features, health status, etc.
11.	What jobs did you hold?
12.	Where did you live? Details: city, state, house, apartment, address?

13. Did you serve in the military? Details: When? What branch? etc.
14. Do you have any political affiliation you would like to share?
15. Do you follow any religious tradition you would like to share?
16. Do you have any medical issues you would like to share?
17. What have you learned over the years that you would like to share with the younger generation?
18. Were you involved in sports, music, drama or other extra curricular activities?
19. What are you most grateful for in your life?
20. What haven't we talked about that you would like to add?
